7. Installation of Rainwater harvesting tanks to four public primary schools, Kenya

- Organization: Elite Community Development Empowerment Programme (ECODEP) (#180)
- Cost: 1,639.3 USD (JWF Fund 975 USD, Contribution from the ECODEP Organization 310.3 USD and beneficiaries 354 USD)
- Number of direct beneficiaries: 3,457 people
- Background: The schools in the slum of Mitume, including the target schools: Lukhuna Primary School, Masinde Muliro Primary School, Kaloleni Annex Primary and Matisi Primary school, suffered from an absent, insufficient, or unreliable water supply, as well as inadequate sanitation and hand-washing facilities. A majority of the schools' pupils were consuming unclean water, resulting in widespread water-borne diseases, including diarrhea. The school administrations were confronted with the problem of overstretched sanitation and hygiene facilities due to a high enrollment rate and limited resource allocation by the government. Children in the target schools were not wash their hands after using the washrooms.

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- Main contents of the project: installation of rainwater harvesting systems, water catchment equipment and hand-washing facilities in each school, four training for teachers on hygienic diseases, class for students on sanitation and hygiene
- Sustainability: The administration of each school will maintain the facilities.

Through improvement of the water supply system, a better living environment in the schools is expected.

We were really delighted when ECODEP offered to install a tank for us. When COVID-19 hit and schools opened we didn't know what to do about the handwashing situation. I'm happy that <u>ECODEP trained us on sanitation and hygiene</u> and through the training I can be sure that incidences of students with stomach aches and diarrhea will greatly decline and as a result there will be minimal cases of absenteeism.
