I. Improving Access to Safe Water through Construction of a Rainwater Harvesting System at SSPI Primary School (Uganda)

(4) Background:

Access to safe water in Nakivale refugee settlement in the New Congo community is an ongoing challenge. People in the refugee camps, the host community, and schools use the same water dam. The community-founded Shaaban Social Progressive Initiative (SSPI), the only primary school in the area, serving over 800 children, is located 4km from the dam. Pupils spend an unsafe 2 to 3 hours per day fetching water from the dam. This has led to pupils, especially girls, dropping out of school, a lack of access to safe drinking water, poor sanitation at the school and an increase in water-related illnesses among pupils and community members.
